Webinar: *New Resources & Research 2020*: "Case Study/Research Agenda/Regional Engagement Inquiries", July 28, 2020, 2:00 - 3:30 p.m. ET

Case Study Development Process Product: Faculty and doctoral students from Jacksonville State University conducted a literature review and internet search for the time period of January 2017 to December 2019 to catalog published disaster and emergency management case studies. There were 1,116 case studies classified according to type of case, hazard, and emergency management focus (mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery). They also developed case study templates and teaching note guidance to facilitate integrated case studies into courses.

**Regional Engagement Trend Analysis:** Faculty from Embry Riddle Aeronautical University conducted an analysis of the regional academic practitioner collaborations sessions hosted by the Higher Education program from 2016 to 2019 with all 10 FEMA regions The analysis examined common threads, unique aspects, strengths and challenges of the individual regions, participants and the overall process.

Research Agenda Implementation: Faculty from the University of Colorado Boulder conducted research for better understanding of the dissemination, use and utility of the research agenda developed in 2017. An examination of the past five years of Natural Hazards Center Quick Response Grants was conducted to discern alignment with the proposed research agenda, document any additional thrust areas that emerge, and any barriers or incentives to conducting research in the proposed thrust areas revealed in the Quick Response Grants examined and documented in the final report.

The Sam Houston State University (SHSU) Center for Assessment, Research, and Educational Safety

(CARES) (https://www.shsu.edu/centers/cares/) is inviting higher education leaders across the U.S. to participate in a research study related to institutional responses to COVID-19. The project, Higher Education Leaders Learning from COVID-19 Response, uses a crowdsourcing data collection method (IdeaScale) to examine decision making process and ideas for responding to the COVID-19 pandemic. The ideas and suggestions collected will help researchers create guidelines for the current and future pandemic response in higher education. CARES understands there are tremendous pressures on you during this time as you deal with the evolving COVID-19 situation. Therefore, it is anticipated data will be collected for at least a year. We hope to learn what U.S. institutions of higher learning did well and what could have been improved in their ongoing COVID-19 response and future crises.

By following the <u>link to the website</u>, you will be prompted to set up an account before gaining access to the data collection tool, IdeaScale. During the profile set up process, there is a 'Hide My Identity' option at the bottom, which will allow your posts and comments to remain confidential if you choose to do so. You can also choose to make only specific posts or comment confidential. Once a member, you will be able to post an idea as well as comment and vote on ideas from other community members. The community has seven categories, called campaigns, and you are encouraged to share all of your ideas in each of these different areas. As this is a year-long study, other campaigns and topics could emerge.

COVID 19 and Transportation: A Special Call for Quick Response Research Grant Proposals
In response to the ongoing challenges of COVID-19, including in the transportation sector, the Natural
Hazards Center has partnered with the Transportation Research Board of the National Academy of Sciences
to issue a special call for quick response research proposals focused on COVID-19 and the transportation
sector.

Proposals to collect perishable data in one of the following three key areas will be accepted until **July 30**, **2020**, at midnight MDT.

- 1. Communications, the Pandemic, and Local Transportation Resources
- 2. Transportation, Vulnerable Populations, and COVID-19
- 3. Transportation and Emergency Management Policy

All proposals will be evaluated simultaneously at the close of this window. Three grants of up to \$4,000 will be funded. Funding notifications will be sent to all applicants no later than August 15, 2020.

This special call for quick response research is based upon work supported by the Transportation Research Board of the National Academy of Sciences. The program promotes social science and interdisciplinary innovation in disaster research. Graduate students, researchers new to the field, and researchers with transportation research expertise are encouraged to apply.

The COVID-19 pandemic and the associated community mitigation efforts enacted have altered the delivery of and access to healthcare across the United States. Healthcare providers are looking for new and innovative ways to deliver patient care to accommodate social distancing and community mitigation measures. The use of telemedicine has grown significantly in recent months. In addition to being used by outpatient providers, telemedicine plays an integral role in alternate care sites (ACSs). ACSs are one of many alternate care strategies intended to provide additional hospital surge capacity and capability.
