



L0363: Multi-Hazard Emergency Management for Higher Education

2025 L0363 Host Application is posted

Deadline for applying to host 2025 offerings – August 16, 2024

This Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) course is designed to be delivered to **teams of campus personnel** who are responsible for managing and supporting emergency plans. The target audience for this course is people who have traditional response or strategic experience but minimal experience in emergency management planning. The 3-day course is primarily interactive presentations coupled with numerous individual and group activities and exercises.

Topics to be covered include:

- An overview of Emergency Management
- Identifying hazards and using a risk assessment process
- Managing your Emergency Operations Center (EOC)
- Partnering with your internal and external community
- Developing and/or revising your Emergency Operations Plan
- Training and testing your plans
- Recovery considerations

For a successful L0363 delivery, a sufficient number of teams from different institutions and range of job positions within each team is needed. The target team size is four to eight members. The composition of the participating campus team is decided by each institution attending and should be selected from these positions.

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How to Apply:

Due to the high demand for this training, an annual application process is used to select the host institutions each year. Application Deadline:

Submit the completed application to your respective [State Office of Emergency Management](#) by August 16, 2024. The State Office of Emergency Management will review the application and forward to the appropriate [FEMA Regional Office](#). **The State Office of Emergency Management must have all applications forwarded to the appropriate FEMA Regional Office by August 30, 2024.** The FEMA Regional Office will review the application, attach a letter from the FEMA Regional Administrator with the appropriate endorsements, and forward the package to the Emergency Management Institute (EMI). The letter from the FEMA Regional Administrator will include the nomination's priority rank, rationale for ranking, and any additional relevant comments. Prior to the start of the final review process, EMI will request a consolidated prioritized ranking of applications from each FEMA Region. **Applications must be received by EMI from the FEMA Regional Offices by September 20, 2024. The FEMA Regional Offices should submit the applications packets via email to FEMA-EMI-MIT@fema.dhs.gov.** A review team will evaluate the application packets in collaboration with the FEMA Regions. The Superintendent of the Emergency Management Institute will make the final decision regarding the selected host institutions. Selected applicants will be notified in October 2024. The applicable FEMA Regional Training Manager and State Training Officer will be included in the notification. Applicants not selected will also be informed.
