

Louisiana State University – B.A. or B.S. in Geography with Concentration in Disaster Science and Management

Louisiana State University is offering an Undergraduate Concentration in Disaster Science and Management. Disaster Science and Management program is an interdisciplinary program which provides students interested in emergency management-related careers in the public, not for profit, and private sectors with:

- A broad understanding of the nature and impact of disasters on the natural, built and human environments;
- A basis for establishing strategies to effectively plan for disasters, mitigate the adverse effects of disasters, respond to disasters, and recover from disasters.

Students may earn either the B.A. or B.S. in Geography with Disaster Science and Management concentration. Students must fulfill the respective requirements for the B.A. or B.S. degree, and will complete a core set of courses (12 credit hours) in Disaster Science and Management to receive the concentration.

Required Courses (12 Hours):

GEOG 2200 Hazards, Disaster, and the Environment
GEOG 2010 Fundamentals of Emergency Management
GEOG 4200 Hazards Risk Reduction

Choose One Geospatial Technique course from the following (3 hours):

- GEOG 4044 Computer Cartography
- GEOG 4045 Environmental Remote Sensing
- GEOG 4047 GIS
