WHY DID THE NAME CHANGE TO EXECUTIVE PIO?

IF I COMPLETED THE MPIO, DO I NEED TO COMPLETE THE PROGRAM AGAIN?

No. The title change does not affect the validity of your completed program. Your certificate reflects the program you successfully completed at the time.
